Law School Modules

One of the best things about studying Law at University is the freedom to choose your modules! Law is such a broad subject, and we choose what we'd like to specialise in. (Modules are like topics within a subject – some topics you have to study, but there are loads of choices for optional topics too)

In my first year, we studied most of the core modules for a Qualifying Law Degree. We looked at a range of things, from contracts to government, as well as learning the basics of our English Legal System. The first year of university is brilliant for becoming accustomed to all that is new. Our tutors are so helpful and understanding, they made my first year a breeze! As many people are from different walks of life and have different educational backgrounds, we were taught everything and given as much support as we required.

These achievements really help you feel motivated to complete your work to the best of your ability!

In my third year, I felt awfully upset that it was my final year of such an amazing course. However, all but one of my modules were chosen by me and I had such fun studying the things I loved! I chose a mix of modules, some more practical than others. One of my modules required me to work on actual legal cases to develop my skills. It was so exciting to put everything I had learnt into practice. Law School Facilities

Law School is the Harry Peach library. Separate to the library on the main campus, the Harry Peach library is situated within the Law School, filled with hundreds of old books. It's also a really great place to get creative with your work as the tables are enormous! Adjacent to the Law School is The David Wilson Library, used by students across the University, which is also a great space for revision and socialising. The library café is a fantastic place to meet friends whilst grabbing a snack. You can also book study rooms, which are really useful when partaking in the group projects often set in your first year of Law!

Aside from the libraries, there are many other facilities available to aid your learning. The Law School Reception is a great place to start if you need any support whatsoever. Additionally, each student is assigned a Year Tutor, and you can drop in or book appointments for any support you may need. You may choose to have a mentor, who can help coach you through your degree, as well as general student life.

Extra-Curricular Activities

vast array of extra-curricular activities to get involved with. Each year, the Law
